The Homework Connection



Rondout Valley High School seeks to promote in each student a life-long love for learning. High School students should plan to do homework <u>every night</u>. Homework can take many forms; practicing a musical instrument, writing a short story, preparing a lab report, rehearsing one's lines for a play, evaluating a historical document, and so on. In each case, however, homework requires time, self-discipline, concentration and commitment.

Consequences for not doing homework include: being unprepared for class, a low grade point average, and a poor class ranking. It may even mean failing a course. Teachers may assign Teacher Study Support (TSS). TSS meets Mondays, Wednesdays & Thursdays from 2:30-4:00 with the TSS teachers. Students may drop in for extra help on their own as well. TSS provides a supportive setting for study. If at any time a student encounters difficulty, they should seek assistance from a classroom teacher after school.

Along with TSS and teacher support, students may also access the National Honor Society (NHS) Peer Tutoring program. NHS student work one-on-one with students to provide academic support in all subjects. Phone the counseling office to begin this service.

Grades are one of the most important factors in college admissions decisions. The second most important factor is a high score on college admissions test, the SAT and/or ACT. Conveniently, the best preparation for these exams is to get high grades. Taking challenging classes and working hard in them is the very best preparation. While you can pay lots of money for SAT and/or ACT prep classes, completing all homework and preparing for exams in the best choice. Do your homework. It absolutely pays.

Completion of homework is essential to progressing in high school. Students need a certain number of credits to proceed onto the next grade. Students must attain 5 credits in order to attain tenth grade/sophomore status, 10 credits are required to attain eleventh grade/junior status, 15 credits are required in order to attain twelfth grade/senior status, and 22 credits are required for graduation as designated below:

<u>Grade</u>		Required Credits
Sophomore/10 th grade	=	5 credits
Junior/11 th grade	=	10 credits
Senior/12 th grade	=	15 credits
Graduate	=	22 credits

College Entrance Exams



PSAT/NMSQT

The Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT), taken in the fall of the junior year, acts as a dress rehearsal for the SAT. It is a four hour exam made up of verbal, math, and writing sections. This exam does not count in college admissions. The PSAT serves as the very selective National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT). Visit www.collegeboard.org for information.

Benefits to taking the PSAT:

- Participate in the Student Search Service by having your name sent to colleges;
- Predict your SAT Reasoning score and assess your verbal, math and writing skills.

ACT & SAT

The American College Test (ACT) and the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) are college admission tests. Remember to check the admission requirements for each college. Most four-year colleges and universities in the country accept ACT and SAT scores equally. Taking both tests may increase your chances of getting into your first-choice college. Visit these websites www.actstudent.org and www.collegeboard.org early in ninth and often through twelfth grade.

The **ACT** includes English, Mathematics, Reading, Science reasoning, and a writing portion. The ACT takes about two hours and forty-five minutes to complete. Give yourself an hour to register for the ACT on line. The ACT registration includes and interest inventory to help you choose a college major and identify jobs you may wish to explore. Take time with this as the results may provide you with important information. Selective colleges may accept the ACT in lieu of the three SAT Subject area exams, which they sometimes require for admission. Register on-line to take test 8 weeks in advance at www.act.student.org.

The **SAT reasoning exam** is designed to measure your verbal, mathematical reasoning and writing skills. The SAT test begins at 7:45 AM and runs until about 1PM. Register on-line to take test 8 weeks in advance at www.collegboard.org

The **SAT subject tests** are also required by selective colleges. Colleges may require three SAT subject area exams, or, as mentioned above, the ACT. The dates and times are available on www.collegeboard.org Register on-line to take test 8 weeks in advance.

The goal of both tests is to help colleges predict your academic success. For students who are undecided about possible college choices it is recommended that they begin taking the SAT subject test, e.g. biology, as early as their freshman year. This may seem early, but for the academically motivated student, it is important to plan ahead.

<u>VERY IMPORTANT:</u> If you have an IEP or a 504 and you need test accommodations on <u>AP, PSAT, SAT or ACT exams you must complete an SSD Form-see your counselor.</u>

Register early in the year for SAT and ACT exams and remember:

- The best preparation is to take the most challenging classes and to work very hard in them. Study hard and read often;
- Rondout Valley High School offers the November and May SAT Reasoning and SAT Subject tests. The Reasoning test takes an entire Saturday morning. Two or three Subject tests may be taken together on one Saturday morning;
- Rondout Valley High School offers the April ACT. Statistics show that students typically score highest in April of the junior year. Always take the ACT with writing. It takes a little longer but colleges want the <u>ACT with writing</u> for college admission purposes;
- You will need an hour or more just to register-register on-line;
- Have four colleges in mind when you register. This will save you money
 as they will send score reports to four colleges if you list their codes at the
 time you register for the exam;
- Read carefully about how to prepare and what to bring to the exam. Bring two number two pencils, an approved calculator, water, your admission ticket, etc. to the exam;
- Save all of your registration materials, passwords etc. as you may need to access these over the next four years;
- You will need these codes: Rondout Valley school CEEB code and the Rondout Valley test site code if you want to take the SAT or ACT at Rondout;

If you plan to take an exam at a different site, you will need those Codes. You will always enter our R.V. CEEB code: 332-680. Our Rondout Valley CEEB and site codes are:

COLLEGE-LEVEL COURSES

Advanced Placement (AP) courses are college-level classes offered here in the high school. Each course has an AP exam in May. The cost for each exam is currently \$92.00. Tests are scored 1-5 and college's award credit accordingly. If you need testing accommodations you must complete an SSD Form. Collegian classes are also college-level courses. Our faculty members teach the Collegian classes in collaboration with the State University of New York (SUNY).

EARLY ADMISSIONS to SUNY ULSTER

Early admission to SUNY Ulster is available to seniors with a high GPA; 80% or above average may attend part-time and 85% or above average may attend full-time. An informational meeting will be held each April in the High School library.

NATIONAL COLLEGIATE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION (NCAA)

All student athletes should visit www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. Division I & II college
Athletes must register at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. Let the counseling office know if you register. NCAA is the governing body of college athletes. It sets academic standards for incoming freshman athletes. Standards include testing (SAT or ACT), specific course requirements, minimum GPA requirements and an application to the NCAA. No student athlete can be offered a scholarship unless standards are met.

COLLEGE APPLICATIONS

Students can begin college applications in July prior to their senior year. Applications should be completed in October; the earlier, the better. Go to www.commonapp.org.

Many colleges will accept this. If you are applying to a college that does not accept the Common Application, contact the college. **COLLEGE APPLICATIONS ARE DUE IN THE COUNSELING OFFICE BY DEC.** 15TH.

Early Admission- Students must apply in early October. This allows students to hear early from several schools about admission. Students are notified early of acceptance but need not commit to attend.

Early Decision- Students must apply in early October. This allows students to hear early from their first-choice school. If accepted, the student must withdraw all applications from other schools and is ethically bound to attend this school.

FINANCIAL AID APPLICATIONS

Grades 9 – 12

Never pay for college financial aid application assistance. This is always free to you through every college financial aid office. Seniors, apply for the Rondout Valley Scholarships in February of the senior year. Watch deadlines!

Students should begin searching for scholarships in ninth grade. Register with <u>www.fastweb.com</u>. Check the scholarship drawer in the Counseling Office, check the H.S. website, also check with parent's employers and visit <u>www.nysfaaa.org</u>.

SENIORS *FAFSA*, Free Application for Federal Student Aid, should be completed in early January at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Complete the CSS *Profile* in the fall if needed. Just like the college applications. Contact each Financial Aid Office early and often. They are there to help.



Help us to make it the kind of letter that will allow the admissions counselors to know what is wonderful about your child. We are in essence asking you to put together a "brag sheet" on your child. Take time to record all of the things you are most proud of as we move forward with the college application process.

You may wish to consider listing:

- Descriptive terms for your child such as academic, independent, friendly, generous;
- Extra-curricular activities;
- Neighborhood activities;
- Activities within your place of worship;
- Jobs held and accomplishments there;
- Your child's greatest strengths;
- Your child's accomplishments in organizations such as Scouting, Youth Groups, Teen Centers
- Academic programs and awards in and out of school;
- Athletic programs and awards in and out of school.

THE A-K COLLEGE APPLICACTION PROCESS

JUNIOR YEAR:

- **A.** Utilize GuidanceDirect, a college search program. Speak with your counselor. Explore a variety of resources. Speak with teachers, parents and friends about colleges. Attend college fairs. Use the internet; collegeboard.org, collegenet.com, actstudent.org, and collegebasics.com. Decide on a list of colleges. Look ahead. Meet with your school counselor soon and often.
- **B.** Athletes, complete the NCAA forms. Register on line at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. You must come to the counseling office to notify your counselor if you have registered.

SENIOR YEAR:

- **C.** Go to www.commonapp.org to begin your college applications beginning July 1st. Decide on applying by Early Decision or regular admissions. Apply on-line or contact schools for the applications. Apply early. Early applications have an edge. Hand the Counselor portion of any paper applications into the Counseling Office. Attend college Open House(s) and overnight visits. This will give you a better feel for the college campus.
- **D.** Request letters of recommendation. Provide teachers, counselors and coaches with a copy of your *Activity Sheet* (available in the counseling office) or a resume and ask your parents to complete a parent's *Reflections* page if you are asking them to write a letter of recommendation. This will help them to back up their many accolades of you with facts. Ask teachers & coaches to submit a copy of the letter of recommendation to the counseling office.
- **E.** Write the college essay with assistance from your teachers and others.
- **F.** Complete the *Transcript Request Form*, even if you are applying on-line, once you have completed the applications and requested letters. Supply the campus address, phone and FAX numbers. If you need your transcript mailed it will be ready in three business days.
- G. Contact each Financial Aid Office. Phone or email offices to request financial aid information. File the CSS Profile. Go to www.fafsa.ed.gov to gather info and file in early January. The financial Aid office at every college will help you to complete the FAFSA and CSS Profile. Attend the Financial Aid Night presentation at the High School. (date & time on Counseling calendar) Continue to apply for scholarships. Visit www.fastweb.com and www.nysfinaid.com
- H. NOVEMBER: If still needed, take November SAT here or the December ACT in Kingston.
- I. DECEMBER: Complete all college applications by December 15th. Check with teachers to see if they have submitted a copy of your letter of recommendation on-line and to the counseling office. Mail/submit online your completed application and let the counseling office know you have sent your application if it is mailed so that they can send your transcript & letters of recommendations to the college(s).
- **J.** JANUARY: Email or phone each college Admissions offices after submitting applications. Ask if if your application is all in order. Phone colleges in mid-February to see if they have received mid-year reports.
- **K.** APRIL: Visit colleges you are accepted to and make the final decision by May 1st. Inform the High School Counseling Office of your final decision.
